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Original full-length papers, short communications, book reviews as well as reviews invited by the Editor-in-Chief on science-based research and management in the field of renewable natural resources are published in this journal. Unless by invitation, only work done on African, Arabian and Malagasy species, either *in situ* or *ex situ*, will be considered for publication. Contributions will be sent to at least two referees for review and papers will usually be published in order of acceptance. **Authors must** provide a covering letter stating that the manuscript is not under consideration by another journal, AND will not be submitted to such a journal until and unless a final, written rejection decision from the present journal has been received. Authorship must conform to the notions of responsibility and credit; thus special attention must be given to the first 'lead' author (sometimes explicitly shared), and the inclusion in the authorship listing only of persons who have contributed directly to the production of the work at an intellectual/conceptual level. Authors should also confirm that all co-authors have seen the final version of the manuscript and approved its submission to the journal. The e-mail addresses of all co-authors should be provided. The covering letter should also state any conflicts of interest associated with the manuscript. Copyright of papers that are published in the Journal is vested in the Southern African Wildlife Management Association and authors bear the sole responsibility for the factual accuracy of their publications. Note that the journal has a 24 month open access delay on published articles. Therefore accepted published articles may only be shared on other platforms 24 months after publication.

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Use the SI metric system for **units of measurement**. Spell out numbers from one to nine; use numerals for larger numbers, groups of numbers, fractions or with units, *e.g.* three; 8–16; 4 kg/ha; 27 impala. Statistical symbols, *e.g.* χ , should be identified in the margin (Greek *l.c.* chi), and variables in equations should be in italics.
